More on the Sept. 18 4-Hands Piano Concert: Julie Coucheron and Will Ransom have performed together from Atlanta to Mexico to Alaska at one and two pianos. Their repertoire ranges from Mozart Sonatas to Beethoven Symphonies to Gershwin's Preludes and everything in between. Born in Oslo, Norway, Julie performs as a soloist, in duet programs with Will and

with her brother David, Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. She is on the faculty of Kennesaw State University. <u>Will</u> is Emerson Professor of Piano at Emory University where he is also Artistic Director of the Emory Chamber Music Society of Atlanta. In the summers, he directs the Highlands-Cashiers Chamber Music Festival. The program is over an hour long with no intermission.
